Welcome

Our welcomers are available to assist with any of the following access information.

Welcome whether you are joining us today in our building or online. Our cameras focus on those who are leading our service, but if you are in the building and would like to ensure that you are not caught on camera, please sit beyond the pillars on the south of the church (to the right as you enter).

Welcome if you are disabled, unwell, have experiences of dementia, physical, sensory, cognitive or mental health issues, or are neurodivergent. The order of service is online or large print copies are available. The hearing loop works best on the south side of the church. Step-free access to church is via the ramp on the north side, and to the Crypt and Hall via lifts in the NW porch and Pavilion.

Welcome to babies, children and young people. We understand that young children make noise. If your baby becomes upset during the service, you are welcome to go to the back of church if needed to settle — or to our children's church room. We support breastfeeding in services; we also have a room allocated if preferred. We have children's church groups during the service (currently alternate weeks) and a monthly group for teenagers after Sunday morning worship.

Welcome to all experiences of race, culture and language. At the Lord's Prayer all are invited to bring the gift of our first language to our worship. Our 1.30pm is in Cantonese: our welcomers are happy to help where they can if you are new to English. You are also very welcome if you are LGBTQIA+.

If you do not want to or cannot receive bread or wine for whatever reason you are welcome to let the priest know you would like to receive a simple prayer for blessing, or to stay in your seat. The Liturgy of the Word

First Reading Job 23: 1-9, 16-end read by Lois Howarth

Then Job answered: 'Today also my complaint is bitter; his hand is heavy despite my groaning. O that I knew where I might find him, that I might come even to his dwelling. I would lay my case before him, and fill my mouth with arguments. I would learn what he would answer me, and understand what he would say to me. Would he contend with me in the greatness of his power? No; but he would give heed to me. There an upright person could reason with him, and I should be acquitted for ever by my judge.

'If I go forward, he is not there; or backward, I cannot perceive him; on the left he hides, and I cannot behold him; I turn to the right, but I cannot see him. God has made my heart faint; the Almighty has terrified me; If only I could vanish in darkness, and thick darkness would cover my face!

Gospel Reading Luke 5: 12-25

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

All Glory to you, O Lord.

Once, when Jesus was in one of the cities, there was a man covered with leprosy. When he saw Jesus, he bowed with his face to the ground and begged him, 'Lord, if you choose, you can make me clean.' Then Jesus stretched out his hand, touched him, and said, 'I do choose. Be made clean.' Immediately the leprosy left him. And he ordered him to tell no one. 'Go', he said, 'and show yourself to the priest, and, as Moses commanded, make an offering for your cleansing, for a testimony to them.' But now more than ever the word about Jesus spread abroad; many crowds would gather to hear him and to be cured of their diseases. But he would withdraw to deserted places and pray.

One day, while he was teaching, Pharisees and teachers of the law were sitting nearby (they had come from every village of Galilee and Judea and from Jerusalem); and the power of the Lord was with him to heal. Just then some men came, carrying a paralysed man on a bed. They were trying to bring him in and lay him before Jesus; but finding no way to bring him in because of the crowd, they went up on the roof and let him down with his bed through the tiles into the middle of the crowd in front of Jesus. When he saw their faith, he said, 'Friend, your sins are forgiven you.' Then the scribes and the Pharisees began to question, 'Who is this who is speaking blasphemies? Who can forgive sins but God alone?' When Jesus perceived their questionings, he answered them, 'Why do you raise such questions in your hearts? Which is easier, to say, "Your sins are forgiven you", or to say, "Stand up and walk"? But so that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins'—he said to the one who was paralysed—'I say to you, stand up and take your bed and go to your home.' Immediately he stood up before them, took what he had been lying on, and went to his home, glorifying God.

All and also with you.


Lift up your hearts.

Besieging God, in whom the future is always bigger than the past, your son, the Sun of Righteousness, rose with healing in his wings. Your prophets brought truth and healing to your chosen people, and in Christ you turned that healing into the offer of salvation for all humankind. He gave his disciples power to heal, and he told them that when they cared for the sick they would see him face to face. When you bring us healing you give us a foretaste of the salvation you intend for us all around your throne in glory. Now we join the angels and archangels surrounding you, singing the hymn of your unending praise.



Saving God, your son meets us in the humble accompaniment of his incarnation, the deep mystery of his transfiguration, and the transforming joy of his resurrection. Send the Comforter and Advocate upon us that we may know Christ's healing power in body, mind and spirit. Send down your Holy Spirit that this bread and this wine may be for us the body and blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Who, at supper with his disciples, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying, 'Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.' After supper he took the cup. Again he gave you thanks, and gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.'

Great is the mystery of faith.

All Christ has died: Christ is risen: Christ will come again. Renewing God, visit your children whose lives are beset by sorrow, pain, fear, or bewilderment. Make their time of distress an occasion for new encounter with your way, truth and life. Empower any who walk alongside those in the valley of despair, that each may find a blessing in the other. Visit homes, neighbourhoods, institutions and nations that are sick at heart. Invigorate your church that it may share the wonder of your Son's resurrection even as it bears the scars of his cross. Be close to any who experience the Holy Saturday between agony and hope, and know the isolation of anxiety. Give us signs of your glory, that our hearts may burn within us as we long for the full realisation of everything you have in store for your people, in the community of your son and the grace of your Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Lord's Prayer


As our Saviour taught us, so we pray, each in our own preferred language.
